GENERAL GUIDELINES TO PARENTS/GUARDIANS

Parents and guardians must read and explain the school rules to their wards.

1. **Any communication made by the parent/guardian should be addressed to the H.M./Principal.** The application should mention the child's name, address, phone number, admission number, class, and section.
2. Parents are requested to refrain from entering the classrooms or making telephone calls to contact or see their children/teachers during school hours.
3. **Any change in the Residential Address, Telephone Number or other vital information should be promptly intimated in writing to the school.**
4. Parents must ensure that they send their children with an appropriate lunch. Due to security and safety concerns, requests to bring the lunch box to school later will not be entertained.
5. Parents should not criticise the school or teachers in the presence of their children, as it causes the student to lose respect for the teachers, resulting in a failure to learn and consequently retarding their progress.
6. If parents have a legitimate complaint, they must meet the Principal as soon as possible. The Principal will personally verify the complaint.
7. Parents are required to co-operate with the school in its attempt to help their children progress by paying attention to their regularity, punctuality and discipline and taking a keen interest in their work. **(They should check the Almanac every day and note the homework and other instructions given. They are advised to check the bags of their wards to see if any circular/notice/invitation has been issued.)**
8. Care must be taken of the school and its property, and if any damage is done, the student(s) concerned must compensate for the damage.
9. **Students are not allowed to wear earrings or nose rings.** Girls are allowed to wear only small tops and studs (pins). **Girls from Class III onwards must tie two hair plaits daily. No student is allowed to wear nail polish/mehendi/tattoos under any circumstance on the pretext of marriage, Rakhi, etc.**
10. Students cannot bring valuable articles to school, such as expensive watches, fountain pens, transistors, cameras, calculators, or jewellery.
11. All students are expected to join the school on the notified date at the beginning of the term and after each vacation.
12. **If parents or guardians fail to meet with the school authorities when advised, their ward may not be allowed to attend classes until the meeting occurs.**
13. Parents should refrain from contacting teachers over the phone, but they can meet them by prior appointment.



GENERAL GUIDELINES TO PARENTS/GUARDIANS

14. Parents and guardians must understand that the student's absence during the term is not in the student's best interest. Parents are asked not to apply for leave if it is avoidable.

Leaves can be granted to the students only on the following grounds:

- In case of severe illness or death of a close relative.
 - For a condolence visit, if the student is the only male family member, as custom demands.
 - To attend the marriage of his / her brother, sister, uncle, or aunt.
15. Parents must check the school calendar, date sheets, and other circulars before making enquiries.
16. Students cannot bring sweets, presents, etc., to school to mark their/another's birthday or any other occasion.
17. Parents are requested to refrain from entering the school buses to drop off and receive their wards.
18. Parents should not try to overtake and stop the school bus to facilitate their children's boarding, as this endangers their safety.
19. Parents should not argue with the bus duty teachers or the conductor/driver. If there is any problem, a written complaint should be submitted to the Principal.
20. Parents are requested not to send any non-vegetarian food, including egg-based preparations, to school. Only nutritious and healthy vegetarian food should be packed in the tiffin boxes.
21. Parents are advised to regularly check their child's haircut, nails, uniform, and punctuality.
22. Parents are requested to encourage their children to converse in English at home. This is crucial for enhancing their conversational skills and fostering a conducive school environment.
23. Students should observe politeness wherever they go. They should never forget that their conduct judges the school.
24. The student's Name, Class, & Section should be marked on all belongings, including the blazer, etc.

Parents and guardians must read and explain the school rules to their wards.



SCHOOL RULES

1. **Every student should carry their Almanac to School every day.**
2. Parents are requested to use the school bus facility to commute their wards to the school. Non-bus commuters should arrive at school 10 minutes before the start of the Home Room period.
3. In the morning, the warning bell will ring 5 minutes before the start of the Home Room period, which is the signal for all students to go to their respective classrooms. It should be done promptly and in silence. As soon as they are in their classes, students must prepare for the assembly/period.
4. Change of classrooms between periods should be done in silence and in an orderly manner.
5. Non-Sikh boys should get their hair cut at regular intervals. The cut should be a simple boy's cut. Girls with long hair must tie their hair neatly into plaits and wear a hair band.
6. No shouting or whistling is allowed in or around the school premises. Running in the corridors is strictly prohibited.
7. Throwing any object(s) at anyone is strictly forbidden.
8. No child should damage/spoil the school or other children's property. Any such damage shall be made good by the parents. Intentional damage may lead to termination.
9. Any damage done will be compensated by the student concerned, together with a heavy fine imposed on them for such an offence. Anyone who notices something damaged should report the matter, even if they do not know who has done it.
10. Students are not allowed to bring sharp instruments or valuables to the school.
11. Books (besides textbooks or library books), magazines or paper may only be brought to the school with the Class Teacher's permission.
12. Lending or borrowing of money or other articles is not permitted.
13. Students who come to school in the care of attendants should always stay on the premises until the attendant arrives. In the event of a delay, they should report to the school office. Those who go home alone should remain calm on the way, but should return home promptly after school. Students are warned not to buy or receive anything from anyone on the way home or to school.
14. They should greet their teachers whenever and wherever they meet them.
15. **The School reserves the right to terminate the enrollment of any student whose progress in studies is unsatisfactory or whose conduct is a bad influence on others.**
16. Exploding crackers or splashing colours during Diwali / Holi or any other occasion on the school premises or buses are strictly forbidden. Non-compliance with these instructions can result in severe consequences, including expulsion from the school.
17. Students should attend the festivals and functions celebrated in the school.
18. **Students cannot carry mobile phones, electronic gadgets, or any banned items / contraband to school.** Stern action (that might lead to expulsion) will be taken against students violating this rule.
19. **Students must come to school only in the proper uniform. This rule applies even when they come to school for any purpose other than attending classes or after school hours.**
20. **Wearing low-waist trousers is not allowed.**
21. If any child does not come in proper uniform, they will be sent back home (with parents) after the third warning, for which parents will receive a call from the school to pick up their ward, and the child will be marked absent for the day.
22. **The dates for Open Day and PTM will be communicated in advance via messages and email.**
23. The School will not receive any tiffin or lunch box during school hours for safety reasons.





ABSENCE FROM SCHOOL

1. Students who have been absent the previous day will not be allowed to attend the class unless their parent(s) has/have submitted an explanation stating the reason for the absence in the Absence and Leave Record section of the Almanac for each day (Application valid for two days) the student has been absent from school. If a child reports to school without an explanation in the Almanac, the parents will be called to the school, and the child will be sent back home.
2. In case of absence for more than two days on medical grounds, a Medical Certificate and prescription (photocopies) should be attached with the application.
3. There is no provision for half-day leave. Therefore, students who are not well should not be sent to school even during assessments. The child will be marked absent if taken home by parent(s)/guardian(s)/authorised person during school hours, even if it is an assessment day. The child will not be awarded a grade for the assessment on that particular day.
4. A student returning to school after suffering from an infectious or contagious disease should produce a doctor's fitness certificate, permitting them to attend school. Students suffering from the following diseases must observe the prescribed quarantine period before returning to school.

Disease	Precautions/Desired Quarantine Period
Chicken Pox	Till the scabs fall off completely.
Cholera	Till the child has completely recovered.
Measles	Two weeks after the rashes disappear.
Mumps	Until the swelling has gone away.
Whooping Cough	Six weeks
Jaundice	Six weeks
Conjunctivitis	One week
Typhoid	Three weeks

5. Students who require medical attention during school hours may be sent to the school Infirmary by the teacher concerned, who will enter the nature of the complaint and sign the 'School Clinic Record' section of the Almanac.
6. Students should visit the School Infirmary only in an emergency if an entry has been made in the Almanac by a teacher.
7. Parents will be promptly informed in the event of serious illness/emergency and may be requested to come to school to take their child home, if necessary.
8. Repeated absence without notice or unexplained absence without written application for more than six consecutive days, renders the student liable to have their name struck off the rolls. Re-admission may only be granted after the payment of the re-admission fee.

LATE ARRIVAL AT SCHOOL

Students should arrive at the School 5 minutes before the Home Room Period starts. Students arriving late may enter only with a valid explanation.

Arriving late to school is not acceptable. Students who are late more than once in a term or semester will not be allowed to attend classes from the second instance onwards.



ADMISSION/WITHDRAWAL/TERMINATION/EXPULSION

Admission :

1. A child seeking admission to the school must first register their name on the school website and submit the forms to the school office.
2. Admission to the school is considered based on age, merit and vacancy.
3. The School reserves the right to grant admission to a student.
4. If, later, at any stage, it is found that the information provided to the school is incorrect, the admission will be cancelled.

Continuity of Enrollment

The enrollment of a student shall remain active until the school receives a formal written application from the parent/guardian requesting the issuance of a Transfer Certificate (TC). Verbal communication, absence from school, or non-payment of fees shall not be treated as a request for withdrawal.

Withdrawal :

1. One clear calendar month's notice in writing or a month's fee instead of notice must be given before the pupil is withdrawn.
2. Those who leave school during the session must, in all cases, pay the fees for the month last attended.
3. A Transfer Certificate is issued once all the school dues are settled / cleared.
4. Students can be asked to leave the school on the following grounds:
 - Disciplinary
 - Unsatisfactory progress in studies.
 - Detention / repeated detentions in a class.
5. The school espouses politeness in talk and behaviour as a particular aspect of education. Any rude/impolite behaviour towards staff members in/outside the school by any student/parent/guardian shall be sufficient reason for the immediate expulsion of the student from the school rolls.

Fee Liability Until TC Application

All school fees will remain payable up to and including the date on which the written TC application is received by the school office, irrespective of the student's attendance during that period. This policy is essential to prevent seat blocking and to maintain administrative and statutory compliance.

Requirement for Timely TC Application

Parents/guardians who do not wish their ward to continue at DPS Deoghar must submit a written request for TC without delay, either:

1. In person at the school office, or
2. Through the official school email ID.

T. C. / Other Certified copies :

A T. C. is issued on payment of Rs. 500/-. A duplicate copy of T. C. is not ordinarily issued. In exceptional cases, the certificate can be issued after verification, subject to payment of Rs. 700/- as a Duplicate Certificate Fee.

NOTE: Application forms for transfer certificates, address changes, duplicate ID cards, transport changes, and bona fide student / fee certificates are available on the school website. The required forms should be downloaded, filled out, and submitted to the school office.

HOUSE UNIFORM

House T-shirts and Track Pants are mandatory for boys and girls in all classes.

For all children, boys and girls alike, black shoes are the proper footwear for summer and winter. No shoes of any other colour or kind, chappals or high-heeled sandals, are permissible.

As long as students are on the school roll, they must always come to school in uniform during practice sessions and extra classes.

No student is allowed to attend a report reading/any school function in or outside the school in any dress other than the school uniform.

The napkin and the mat are an integral part of the school uniform, so junior primary students must carry them to school daily.

The schedule of the house uniform is as follows:

- 1. Cyan Blue T-shirt with Track pants every Wednesday.**
- 2. House Uniform every Friday.**



SCHOOL TRANSPORT

Students can use school transport, subject to seat availability. The school transport routes are drawn up, and parents should consult the school transport in charge for the necessary details. The school reserves the right to provide transport facilities to the students.

BUS RULES:

1. Students using the school transport must arrive at the bus stop at least five minutes before, on the correct side.
2. Students can use only the allotted vehicle and bus/winger stop. With the school's prior written permission, all changes can be allowed.
3. The buses will not wait for latecomers. Students who miss their allotted bus/winger must not attempt to board any other vehicle. Parents will be responsible for dropping their ward off at the school gate. However, the student will return by his or her allotted bus/winger.
4. The students should stay away from the main road until the vehicle arrives. They should only approach the vehicle's entry door once it has come to a complete halt. The front door of the vehicle is the only authorised entrance and exit.
5. Boarding and alighting from the vehicles should be done silently and in an orderly manner.
6. All students must occupy vacant seats immediately after boarding their respective vehicles. Seat reservations for co-commuters are not allowed under any circumstances.
7. Students are strictly prohibited from travelling on the footboard.
8. Students must not move around in the vehicle when it is in motion.
9. The students must ensure they clear the bus/winger aisle and correctly place school bags and other belongings.
10. **Students must remain seated on the bus/winger and must not put their hands out of the windows.**
11. No object should be discarded inside or thrown outside the vehicle.
12. Consumption of eatables is not permitted in the buses/wingers.
13. Unruly behaviour like shrieking, shouting and playing mischief is strictly prohibited. Courteous behaviour is expected at all times.
14. The driver's attention must not be distracted for any reason.
15. If, due to particular difficulty, a student has to leave the school campus during school hours by his or her own transport, the following rules have to be observed:
 - to give a written application
 - to take a Permission Slip from reception, duly endorsed, which must be shown at the school gate before leaving the campus.
16. Under no circumstances are students allowed to go behind or under the parked buses on the school campus. Students are also prohibited from sitting in the parked buses/wingers during school hours. They should not touch the instrument panel of the vehicles.
17. Any misbehaviour with the driver, conductor, fellow students or teachers in the bus/winger by a child or a parent will not be tolerated. In such cases, the school reserves the right to cancel the child's transport.
18. The drivers are authorised to stop buses/wingers only at the designated stops unless otherwise directed by the teacher(s) on the bus/winger. The list of stops is prepared to maintain the convenience and safety of all bus/winger commuters and is subject to change as required.
19. Senior boys are not permitted to occupy the rear seats of the bus/winger.





SCHOOL TRANSPORT(Contd.)

20. Parents are advised to contact the school for any issues related to transportation, using the following contact numbers: **9296786345** and **9296786343**. They should avoid discussing or arguing with Bus or Winger Drivers, Conductors or Transport-in-Charge.
21. The students are responsible for maintaining discipline on the bus/winger. Any severe offence must be reported to the HM/Principal immediately.
22. In case of a change in stop or bus/winger (of a temporary or permanent nature), permission for the same has to be sought through a written application.
23. Parents must ensure that their wards do not travel to or from the bus stops unescorted.
24. Parents / Guardians of such students who do not avail of the School Transport should report at the School gate 15 minutes before dispersal to collect their wards.
25. No effort is spared for the safety of the students; however, the school will not be held responsible for any road accident in which the vehicles may unfortunately be involved.
26. **Transport charges are to be paid for the complete academic session (April-March). No request to discontinue the transport facility during the academic year will be entertained.**
27. **The withdrawal of the Transport Facility is not allowed in the last quarter (Jan-March) of the academic year.**
28. **The school should be notified if the student's address changes, so the bus route can be revised.**
29. **The Bus/Winger Numbers allotted can only be changed with the permission of the school authorities.**
30. **The parents need permission from the school to take the student/ward with them on any particular day they want to take their ward(s) with them.**

**GUIDELINES FOR THE PARENTS OF STUDENTS USING
PRIVATE MODES OF TRANSPORT**

1. All the parents will submit an undertaking if they decide to use private vans, taxis, autos, or cabs. This undertaking has to be renewed every year.
2. The private vehicles should drop the students at the School main Gate. After dropping the children, no driver should park their car in the school area. They should arrive 5 minutes before dispersal.
3. If the driver is found to be violating the rules and directions, the parents will be asked to drop their children off personally, and the vehicle will be stopped.
4. During the dispersal, the children will board the private vehicles from school's main gate. Parents should instruct the drivers to park their cars outside the gates and avoid hurrying. They should be counselled not to park their vehicles on the main road.
5. A parent who agrees to pick up a student at their friend's request will have to submit a consent letter from their friend, a photocopy of their identity card, and an undertaking that they take responsibility for the child's safety and security.





SCHOOL LIBRARY

The school library is open to all students of Class II and above. Students visiting the library have to observe the following rules:

1. Every student shall borrow and read books from the library as per the schedule.
2. Students from Classes III to VII will be issued one book at a time for one week.
3. Students will only be eligible for a fresh issue if the previously issued book is returned.
4. If books are returned late without a valid reason, the borrowing facility will be withdrawn for up to one week.
5. Strict silence must be maintained in the library.
6. Reference books are not issued. These books can be consulted within the library premises only.
7. The books that have been marked, disfigured or damaged will have to be replaced by the borrower, or a payment of 50 % over the cost price of the book is to be made.
8. Any student found deliberately damaging or defacing a book may be debarred from the library for the entire term or academic year, and a fine will be levied.
9. The library has an Open Access System, and the students must help to maintain the order and organisation of the collection on different shelves. They must place the books on the shelves strictly according to the subjects after consultation with the Library-in-Charge/Librarian.
10. The students are not allowed to bring their books or belongings to the library.
11. The loss of a Library card shall be immediately reported in writing to the Librarian. A fine of Rs. 100/- will be charged for issuing a duplicate card.
12. The students shall not sub-lend the books issued from the library.
13. If the books are not returned on the due dates, an overdue charge of Rs 10/- per book per day will be charged.
14. We strongly advise parents to encourage their children to read books.



SCHOOL INFIRMARY

A qualified nurse looks after the well-stocked School Infirmary. Medical check-ups of students are regularly carried out, and the record of the same is maintained. The parents are informed if the nurse thinks a child needs special medical attention. It is noted that the school will not administer any medicine to a student, except for basic first aid. In severe cases, the student is carried to the nearby hospital and the parents are informed.

The parents are requested to impart Health Education to their children. It is essential that they follow the tips given below :

- a) Maintain personal hygiene, such as regular trimming of nails and wearing clean uniforms.
- b) Exercise regularly.
- c) Sleep for at least eight hours daily.
- d) Have a balanced diet.
- e) Drink water that is either boiled or filtered. All students are advised to bring their water bottles from home.
- f) Avoid consumption of ice-creams, other milk products and eatables from roadside vendors and kiosks.
- g) All children should also be :
 - i) Dewormed at least twice yearly, on the family physician's advice.
 - ii) Have a dental and ophthalmic check-up by a well-qualified dental surgeon and an ophthalmologist once every year.

GROUNDS FOR TERMINATION

1. Gross indiscipline.
2. Unsatisfactory progress in studies.
3. Habitual late coming.
4. More than one detention in the same class.
5. Non-payment of fees as per specifications.
6. Use of unfair means during Tests/Examinations.
7. Carrying mobile phones to school.
8. Dishonour of cheques payable in favour of the school.
9. Misbehaving with Bus Staff/Teacher.
10. Any other reason as may be deemed fit by the Principal.

HOUSE SYSTEM

To foster a sense of camaraderie, team spirit, and healthy competition among the students, the school assigns every student from Pre-Nursery to Class VII to one of four 'Houses'. It helps develop a sense of belonging among the students and provides them with a platform to showcase their talents through a series of House Competitions organised by the school. These competitions are an excellent way for students to demonstrate their skills and abilities in various areas, including sports, academics, and the arts, and help encourage healthy competition while promoting a positive school culture.

There are four Houses in the school. The names and the colours associated with each are given below :

A House Captain and a House Vice-Captain head every house. The Houses also have House Prefects. A member of the staff, assisted by several other teachers (mentors), acts as House In-charge. Points are awarded to students of each house throughout the year for academic and co-curricular activities, games & sports.



SPORTS



Games and Sports are a particular area of emphasis in the school. Every student should be exposed to as many sports activities as possible. The sports activities conducted in the school are as follows: Cricket, Football, Badminton, Basketball, Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Athletics, Chess, Carrom, Yoga, Horse Riding, Table Tennis, Swimming, Taekwondo, Martial Arts, Lawn Tennis, Volley Ball, Archery, Skating and Handball.

- Students will be trained in Physical Education depending on their physical abilities and interests.
- All children should work towards maximising their natural abilities.

REPRIMANDS

The school discipline system is based on the principle that actions have consequences. It endeavours to be consistent and fair and underpinned by natural justice principles. Clear boundaries must be established for the school community to operate as a safe learning environment where all strive for personal excellence. While rewards motivate the students to sustain good actions and consistently strive for better behaviour and efforts, reprimands are to check undesired actions on the part of the wrong-doer and deter other students from doing the same.

DISCIPLINARY MEASURES

The following disciplinary measures may be adopted by the school in dealing with students behaving in an unruly/inappropriate manner–

1. Oral warning and counselling
2. Written warning
3. Detention during the break or for the whole day
4. Suspension (ranging from 7 days to 30 days)
5. Rustication
6. Withdrawal of transport facility for misbehaviour in the school bus. In such cases, parents will be responsible for their ward's commute, to and from the school.
7. It is expected from every Dipsite/stakeholder of DPS Deoghar that they maintain a very cordial relationship with the school's teaching/non-teaching/housekeeping/transport staff. Students should avoid getting into arguments with the staff. In case of complaints, they must approach the Principal.
8. Misbehaving in class with peers/teachers may result in suspension from school for a month or even expulsion without notice.
9. Students found possessing cameras, mobile phones or electronic gadgets will be charged with heavy fines apart from suspension from school for a week.
10. Students are not allowed to bring weapons or sharp instruments, such as blades, knives, paper scalpels, scissors, etc., to school.

MULTIPLE INTELLIGENCE TRANSDISCIPLINARY PROJECT (MITDP)

At DPS Deoghar, we are committed to academic excellence through a progressive and innovative approach to student learning. Therefore, Project Work is an inherent part of our curriculum, enabling students to experiment, record, and present facts.

This project may be integrated into selected subjects as scheduled.

Each term, one individual and one group project may be planned in every subject. The projects relate to familiar subjects and focus on active learning rather than rote learning. The projects emphasise self-exploration and research and encourage collaborative learning and teamwork. The project presentation aims to develop students' confidence and communication skills.

Please note some of the guidelines given for the projects:

- The project should be handwritten neatly and not typed.
- Parental guidance is solicited, but the focus should be on the efforts put in by the student.
- Teacher(s) will supervise and aid the projects.
- Detailed guidelines about the topics and content should be supplied.

FORMAT OF THE PROJECT

- The project submitted by the students should follow the following format:
 1. Introduction or Preface
 2. Acknowledgement
 3. Body
 4. Bibliography
 5. Conclusion
- This should contain information on the subject and the methodology used. For very young students, e.g. Classes II & III, it can be in the form of bullet points.

The body of the project should reflect the research conducted by the student. Photos and pictures can illustrate this.
- Emphasis will be placed on format, logical sequencing and neatness.

The student will present the Project Report, which will be followed by a question-answer session. Plagiarism and violation of Copyright are strictly prohibited.

EXAMINATION AND PROMOTION POLICY FOR CLASSES III TO V

At this stage, the curriculum supports experiential learning, focuses on conceptual clarity by relating learning to everyday life, and develops thinking and analytical skills. The curriculum also aims to nurture the affective domain of the learners through subjects and activities that will help develop the learner's essential life skills —self-awareness, practical communication skills, and emotional strength. The pedagogy at this stage is not fixed, structured or prescribed, but it is multi-dimensional and flexible, which gives the learner ample opportunities to explore and discover.

The learning areas include Languages (English, Hindi) —Acquiring the learning skills of listening, speaking, reading & writing, acquiring a varied vocabulary, developing interpersonal communication skills and meaningful expression. These languages are taught through activities to initiate the language & learn in a fun-filled way. However, a more structured syllabus is followed in the upper primary stage.

Mathematics – Performing operations of numbers, understanding shapes, similarities and differences, collecting data, representing and analysing the data, identifying patterns in shapes and numbers, etc.

Environmental Science (For Classes III and IV) (Science and Social Science For Class V onwards) – To make them aware of their surroundings so that they can be appreciative and sensitive to environmental issues (natural, physical, social, and cultural).

CBSE ASSESSMENT FRAMEWORK

The competency-based assessment framework aims to strengthen India's existing school education system for secondary level (classes 6-10) and improve the overall learning outcomes of students across India, mainly covering three subjects: English (reading), Science, and Maths.

The framework is a part of the CBSE Competency Based Education Project that aims to replace the existing rote learning model with a competency-based framework as directed in the NEP 2020. It is aligned with the NEP's vision of achieving a global standard in assessments.

The assessment specifications were designed to sample the assessment content set out in the learning ladders and use the design principles. The size of the assessment and the length of time allowed are a balance between sampling enough content to allow the assessments to be valid and show what students know and can do and not being so long that the administration of the assessments is a burden for both the student and the school to deliver. The assessments are generally shorter for lower classes as there is less content to sample and shorter tests are more reasonable for younger students.

Assessment objectives specific for each subject were created using the learning outcomes in the NCERT curriculum as a starting point to identify the high-level skills which needed to be assessed. These assessment objectives are similar to those used in other international qualifications for 11 to 16 year old students and are applied to all classes, though the proportion varies for each class. Generally, there is a greater proportion of higher-order thinking skills assessed in Classes 9 and 10 than in the lower classes.

Each subject takes a slightly different approach because of the nature of the subject and the skills and content that they need to cover. For English, the focus on assessing reading means the assessments are relatively shorter in Classes 6 to 8 than the other subjects as teachers would also be expected to assess students' listening, speaking, and writing skills. This changes at Class 9 with the introduction of literature skills into the assessment and with more extended-response questions, which significantly increase the length of the assessment.

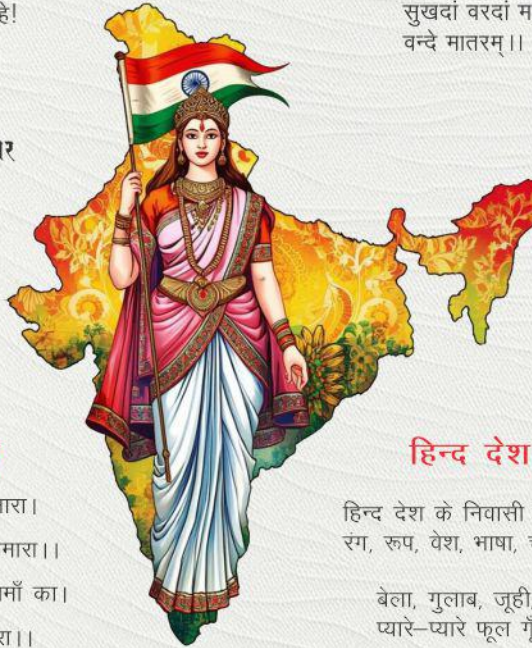
